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Introduction

Although Nila Banton Smith's publishing career began comparatively late in life, her productivity continued for more than fifty years. Her writings encompassed virtually every aspect of reading. This considerable body of work may be subdivided arbitrarily into major publications designed to improve the profession of teaching reading, here termed Professional Publications; Instructional Materials; and more timely, topical writings, here listed as Journal/Book Articles.

American Reading Instruction was the major achievement of her career. However, for sheer volume, her instructional publications dominate her work. From 1922 until 1976, the span of her professional writing career, Smith regularly published in all the major educational journals.

A lifelong teacher and administrator, Nila Banton Smith never lost touch with the classroom, the student, or the teacher. Everything she wrote was preeminently practical. She was most confident and authoritative when discussing classroom problems, particularly when related to basal reading instruction.

Critical evaluation of her writing remains to be done. This bibliography might serve as a source and inspiration for continuing research.
